Jesus pronounced guilty, tied up again and sent to Pilate.) Roman Trial: Trial before Pilate (Mark 15:2-5), Pilate considered Jesus a Jewish religious problem and not a civil one. He was amazed that Jesus did not defend himself. When Pilate heard Jesus was from Galilee he was happy to send him off to Herod Antipas who governed that region.

The Trial of Jesus — Mission Bible Class
There were six parts to Jesus' trial: three stages in a religious court and three stages before a Roman court. Jesus was tried before Annas, the former high priest; Caiaphas, the current high priest; and the Sanhedrin. The trial of Jesus was illegal because it was concluded in one day. Jewish law states, "A criminal case resulting in the acquittal of the accused may terminate the same day on which the trial began. But if a sentence of death is to be pronounced, it cannot be concluded before the following day" (Mishnah, "Sanhedrin" IV, 1).
